





What are T-Levels?

- T Levels are two-year, Level 3 study programmes that follow the study of GCSEs and Technical Awards and offer an alternative to A Levels and Apprenticeships.
- T Levels combine classroom theory, practical learning and a minimum 315 hours of industry placement with an employer. The work placement ensures students have real experience of the workplace.
- T Level programmes are developed in collaboration with employers so that the content meets the needs of industry and prepares students for work. T Levels provide the knowledge and experience needed to progress to highly skilled employment, an Apprenticeship or higher-level study, including university.

5 GCSE's 4 or above to include Maths And English, Textiles / Design technology preferred, sewing machine experience desired

Assessment

The core knowledge and understanding are assessed through an examination and core skills through a practical employer-set project in year 1. In year two there are set design and make assessments, working to a set brief to test technical skills and understanding of the design process.

Students who complete their T Level will receive an overall grade of Pass, Merit or Distinction, the exam is graded A- E. They will get a nationally recognised certificate which will show their overall grade and a breakdown of what they have achieved.

Overview

During the 2-year course, students will learn the core knowledge and skills that are needed for entry to a range of Textiles and Fashion maker occupations or for progression onto a degree course in fashion or textile design.

<u> Year 1</u>

- Industry visits, talks and remote briefs
- Practical skills workshops
- Core content projects to build knowledge for exam.
- 1 x 2.5 hour exam in June testing knowledge of core content = 60%
- 1 x ESP Employer Set Project 40% in June an industry based project set by Pearson
- June / July work placement 1



Year 2

- September = work placement 2
- November = exam re-sit opportunity
- April June = OSP Occupational Specialist Projects

1 x design and make project -65 hours researching, developing, planning, pitching and idea and making an outfit to a set brief

1 x make project – 21 hours making a bag to a specific set brief

Throughout the second year, students will develop design and make skills to prepare for the assessment and build their portfolios.



Industry Placements 45 Day Industry Placement

- 25 hours industry tasters talks, visits, tasters
- 20% can be remote working
- 2 x 3 -4 week industry placements
- We will work with local fashion and textile companies arrange industry visits, talks and placements for Fashion and textiles.
- You can work with companies that we have built links with or arrange your own industry placement if you have contacts.
